World Bioethics Day

World Bioethics Day was observed with collective efforts of MSAI and UNESCO in the month of October 2017, under the guidance of Dr Praveen Arora (Head, World Bioethics Day). The theme for the event was, "Equality, Equity and Justice". The event spanned over a week in 10 medical colleges across the country to sensitize students to bioethics and its different applications and aspects.

A team of 392 students and 28 teachers ensured effective organization of the event. Volunteers conducted orientation, extempore, street play, flash mob, debate, and panel discussion in college campuses. Events such as essay writing, poster making, online photography, slogan writing, 'share your best tip', just-a-minute, video making competition and debate were conducted online.

In addition to various interesting activities, the event also included informative lectures from Dr Russell D'Souza, (Head, Asia Bioethics Wing, UNESCO chair in Bioethics, HAIFA).

More than 1000 students participated in this campaign.

Periodoubt: Menstrual Hygiene Campaign

A national-level campaign was organised by SCORA during the months of November and December on Menstrual Hygiene Management. Nearly 13,000 girls and boys (early adolescents) were addressed across the entire nation. This issue also received special recognition from the District Health and Education Officer (DEO), Mr N.M. Mehta, sanctioning permission for 'Periodoubt' to be conducted in schools all over Ahmedabad.

The campaign was conducted in two spells— an online campaign and a community/on ground campaign. Boys and girls from the age group of 9-13 years were the main target population of this event. They were mainly addressed with the help of audio-visual aids, presentations and posters made by the volunteers.

The event was conducted with the aim of addressing common myths and misconceptions regarding menstruation, encouraging children to discuss about this normal physiological process freely in order to reduce the taboos in society pertaining to menstruation, and bring to light the problems faced by women during menstruation.

They were also provided with information regarding menstrual hygiene, frequency of changing sanitary napkins, accessing sanitary napkins, hand hygiene and overall personal hygiene. The volunteers gave a demonstration on how to use sanitary napkins and how to dispose them off properly. The event was conducted through personal and one-on-one interaction so as to provide a comfortable environment for the students to discuss their problems without any hesitation. Small groups of 5-6 students were made and discussions were conducted. Feedback was obtained through small notes and drawings made by the students.

Professional Exchange Pre-Departure Training

The Standing Committee on Professional Exchange (SCOPE) became active in India in 2016, and in just two years, it has sent more than a hundred students on exchanges and welcomed over 60 incoming students.

Recently, the committee took another major step in improving the exchange experience for outgoing students by conducting a Pre-Departure Training session. Held on 27th January at Grant Government Medical College and Sir J.J. Group of Hospitals, Mumbai, the session lasted four hours and covered a range of topics from Intercultural Learning to Ethics in Medicine. The latter was jointly developed by IFMSA and UNESCO and involved group discussions on various ethical dilemmas that could be faced by exchange students.

Arranged by Chaitanya Kalra, (State Director, Maharashtra), the event was packed with discussions, presentations and activities. The speakers in the session were Iris Blom (SCOPE General Assistant), Saniya Sahasrabudhe, (National Public Health Officer), Aatmika Nair (NEO Assistant), Karan Parikh (NEO, MSAI and SCOPE-RA, Asia Pacific Region, IFMSA).

Rural Health Assessment

Medical students from Rajarshi Chhatrapati Shahu Maharaj Medical College visited Mahadikwadi, a village near Kolhapur, on 6th November 2017. The village was chosen due to its isolated nature, a small population of 800, motivated authorities and its glaring problem of waste management.

The survey aimed not only at assessing the villagers' practices of sanitation but also their attitude towards it. To establish a rapport with the villagers, each volunteer was requested to choose a house at random and interact with the families.

The aim was to find out the status of sanitation and cleanliness of the village. This survey was held as the first step towards the ambitious 'Swachh Bharat, Swasth Bharat (Clean India, Healthy India)' programme, an effort directed towards making a clean environment and sanitation a health priority by SCOPH, MSAI.

Comprehensive Sexual Education

Comprehensive Sexuality Education sessions were organised by SCORA, MSAI, from August 2017 to January 2018 in various schools across India. The local officers were provided CSE training by TARSHI (Talking About Reproductive and Sexual Health Issues), an NGO based in New Delhi, through their online course - 'Basics and Beyond'. Students of classes 6th, 7th, and 8th were addressed on topics such as basic anatomy of the human body, how to differentiate between good touch and bad touch, the pubertal changes which occur during growing up and how to deal with them.

Students of classes 9th and 10th were addressed on topics like genital anatomy and physiological pubertal changes. They were also taught about the importance of consent. They were then addressed with important concepts such as intercourse, rape, contraception and its uses, masturbation, sexuality and sexual orientation. The sessions were delivered with the help of audio-visual aids and various interactive activities.

After evaluation, it was found that there was an increased awareness amongst the students, regarding the concepts after the session. The students were able to communicate freely without any hesitation and were able to get their doubts solved by the volunteers. The sessions targeted about 2700 students throughout the nation.

SCOMEdipedia

SCOMEdipedia is an initiative by the Standing Committee for Medical Education, MSAI, to help fellow medical students cope with their medical syllabus and make learning interesting.

With every month dedicated to one particular theme/topic/system/subject, we hold discussions, doubt-solving sessions and provide a variety of study material to interested members. Mnemonics and multiple choice question quizzes are held to effect better learning among participants.

During the months of December and January, topic-related material was circulated at least thrice a week. A discussion about the chosen topic with professors was conducted at the end of each month via a live webinar.

Bearers of the SCOPE Banner

The SCOPE banner, a 4×10 feet long, blue and white piece of cloth, has had an interesting and unique journey across the world, travelling from the beaches of Portugal, the forests of Amazon to the Dead Sea in Jordan, finally coming to a halt in Arusha, Tanzania for the 67th IFMSA General Assembly in August 2017.

All countries wanted to carry the SCOPE banner home, yet just one would have the honour. In a bid for the same, representatives from MSAI India put up an energetic and fun Bhangra performance to an ecstatic audience. After each country showcased their talents, the delegates voted, a decision was made and the banner was handed over to India

Semicolon; A Mental Health Awareness Project

Even in 2017, the stigma surrounding the discussion on mental health remains a major public health challenge. Data suggest that nearly 10% of the world's population is suffering from depression, anxiety and/or tobacco abuse. Intentional self harm (suicide) is the second most common cause of death within the age groups of 15 to 29 years, and one of the top ten causes of overall mortality, out of which nearly 90 percent of the victims have an underlying mental illness.

Our ongoing project, Semicolon (Mental Health Awareness) addresses high school students (aged 15 to 19 years), and our aim is to focus on raising awareness about various major and minor, organic and inorganic mental health issues, discussion on stigmas associated with mental health issues and introduction to the concept of mental well being, stress coping mechanism, importance of communication and emotional and psychological first aid. Since its inception in September 2017, we have been able to successfully reach more than 1500 high school students in 9 different regions of India. The evaluation from our follow up sessions suggests that 84.53% of the participants could correctly guess major symptoms of clinical depression and 59.86% could guess the symptoms of eating disorders at large. 70.7% of the participants felt confident enough to discuss with the general population (predominantly friends and peers), about mental health issues, associated stigmas, primary prevention, emotional first aid and profess the importance of professional help.

The event is structured in a way so as to actively help medical student volunteers to become informed, sensitized and confident mental health advocates. As of 19th December 2017, 93 medical student volunteers have been responsible for the success of this project by enthusiastically organising and delivering the sessions. The project resources used were all developed with the aid of, and approved by a psychiatrist. Currently, the project is in its implementation phase, with every event being followed by an immediate and independent impact assessment.

Trinity International Winter School

A session on 'Medical Student Involvement in Healthcare: Communicable Diseases' was conducted at the Trinity Winter School this February, which had participants from Philippines, Spain, Turkey, Uganda, Morocco and South Korea. The event was facilitated by Saniya Sahasrabudhe and Arshiet Dhamnaskar. The winter school is recognized by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Government of India.
